




Me "then"...


Here is a picture of us both in front of a model of the Space Shuttle! And here's

We waited in line to see a life-size model of Skylab, the manned space station which was abandoned in 1974. It re-entered the earth's atmosphere in 1979.



My second trip to Washington, District of Columbia (D.C.) was on April 19-22. Mrs. Polly was working with the Cable and Wireless International Childnet Awards folks. <u>http://www.childnet-int.org/</u> Gee, did we have a great time- AND I got to see more of the sites! Here's ME in front of the Washington Monument. It's really a lot taller than I am, but in this picture we look the same size!!!

It's really 555 feet (169+ meters).

A cool thing we did was try out the paddle boats in the Tidal Basin by the Jefferson Memorial. Here's me, Mrs. Polly, and William Belsey.

My legs and hooves were too short to reach the pedals, so I let the other two propel us around.



Here's Mr Polly and Stephen navigating towards the Jefferson Memorial. Jefferson was the third American President, and he's credited with writing the Declaration of Independence, among other famous documents.



You can just see his huge statue in the wide shot of the memorial. Jefferson is on the U.S, \$2 bill (hard to find, you almost never see them in circulation) <u>United States two-dollar bill - Wikipedia</u> and on the Jefferson

nickel, five cent piece.

We also saw the Lincoln Memorial, pictured on the back of U.S pennies. <u>Kids | U.S. Mint for Kids (usmint.gov)</u> <u>Frequently Asked Questions (pennies.org)</u>

Abraham Lincoln himself is on the front of U.S Pennies. I will bring some back with me so you can see them yourself. I hear that if you have a magnifying glass, you can sort of see the statue inside the building! Lincoln and his Memorial are also on the U.S. \$5 bill <u>History | Engraving & Printing (bep.gov)</u>





Speaking of money, here I am at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. That's where they print U.S. dollars!! This wall chart shows you how many dollars tall I am (if you stacked up \$100 bills)




Nearby there was this nice flower bed with tulips in it. Look at it carefully. How do you think THIS happened?

Mrs. Polly says she's sending me home later THIS WEEK.




Did you ever sing the song "I've got a mule and her name is Sal--Fifteen miles on the Erie Canal" --well, I MET Sal herself, and here's a picture. <u>https://youtu.be/HcNJ2RMOd3U</u> She's looking across the street to a very unusual building. It's called the Weighlock Building, and the Erie Canal used to run right through it.



The Erie Canal was very important in the development of New York State. It was built in 1825 and provided a water route from "Albany to Buffalo"--which meant that cargo could go all the way from New York City to the Great Lakes of the Midwest.

Canal boats were charged a toll to travel through the canal. The amount they had to pay was based on the weight of their boats and cargo.


It makes me wonder... how do you weigh a boat?



Look at this model of the building. The canal boats floated behind the pillars, where there was a "lock" to hold back the water. (I'll tell you how locks work in the next message.) All the water was pumped out of that little piece of the canal, leaving the boat suspended on a special scale.

Here I am with the weighmaster. He's showing me how to figure out what to charge a canal boat. Let's go out and look at what's in the weighlock right now.

I'm sitting up on top of the back of the boat. Can you see the kid fishing behind me? There wasn't a lot to do while people travelled on the canal.



The boat's kitchen looks like this. Behind me is the toilet area; the curtain is pulled back so that you can see it. (Usually it's a private area!)







And here's the cookstove, but there wasn't any fire burning in it today



Here's a guy just staring out the window.

It's probably because he didn't want to take a nap in this very narrow and uncomfortable swinging bunk bed!







The museum also has loads of exhibits about things that were invented in Syracuse. When you buy new shoes, does the clerk measure your feet with a tool like this? It's called a Brannock Device and was invented right here!

On the way home we got ice cream. Guess what kind I got!!! On the next message, I'll send photos of my visit to a real lock!!! Love, Monty



Dear Everyone- to continue my "eerie adventure"--Mrs. Polly took me to see a real working lock on the Erie Canal. We visited Lock 23.

When my box gets there, see if you can find it on the map I'm bringing home.

Lock 23 got the 2001 Lock Award for being the prettiest, best-run lock this year.

What's the reason for a lock? Rivers and lakes are at different elevations along the Erie Canal route. If a lake is higher than the river it empties into, there will be a waterfall down into the river. Boats can't go up OR down a waterfall, so they build a sort of boat elevator called a lock. The doors close behind the boat and water is pumped in or out of the lock to make the boat rise

or fall. The doors close behind the boat. The doors at the other end of the lock are already closed.







Now the operator works the special |controls. He gave me a look at them.

Of course he didn't let me actually use the controls myself! They say right valve and left valve, and right and left gate. There's also a Red and Green traffic light so oncoming boat traffic can tell if the lock is open or closed in that direction.



I'm going to send one more letter right before I leave, but right now I'm going to pack!!!
